

## Basketball 10-Second Count Rules for WCAC, IAC, MAC, and PVAC Schools

In these situations, there **WILL** be a **reset of the 10-second count**:

- 1) A foul by the defensive team.
- 2) Charged time out to the offense, and the ball is still in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 3) Injury or Blood Scenarios, and the offensive team still has control in the backcourt.
- 4) Inadvertent whistle and the offensive team still has control in the backcourt.
- 5) An intentional kick by the defense in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 6) Fisting the ball by the defense in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 7) Double Personal Foul and the point of interruption is in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 8) Delay of Game warning on the defense, and the ball is in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 9) Timing error. e.g. shot clock or game clock not started correctly.

In these situations, there **WILL NOT** be a **reset to the 10-second count**:

- 1) The defense causes the ball to go out of bounds in the offensive team's backcourt.
- 2) The defense causes the ball to go out of bounds in the offensive team's backcourt, and then the defense is granted a timeout.
- 3) Held Ball is ruled, and the AP Arrow is pointed to the offensive team.
- 4) Double Technical Foul.

### NOTES:

- The shot clock will be used for the 10-second backcourt count. The Lead or Center official can help the Trail official and call a 10-second violation.
- If the shot clock is turned off, a visible count will be used by the trail official. In this case, only the Trail official should call a 10-second violation.
